MINISTERS' MESSAGE



We are so grateful for the opportunity to come alongside Church of the Foothills in this season of endings and beginnings, grief and gratitude, refocusing and renewal. Let's give each other abundant grace and space during our time together, trusting

that this faith community which seeks to offer a Jesus kind of radical hospitality will continue to grow and flourish.

We recognize how hard it is to say goodbye to a pastor whose vision and values shaped who you are as a congregation in the last twenty-three years. We honor that part of your journey.

We come to you as transitional leaders, bringing new gifts and graces. We will work with you to prepare a hearty welcome to another settled pastor whom God will call to serve you, and we will strive for transparency along the way. Please know that this process will take some time, some prayer and a lot of patience and purposeful engagement.

Can we talk a little about worship first? In May 2020 UCC national leaders asked all UCC congregations to "wait until ALL safety concerns have been addressed." Also in May, Terri Hord Owens, General Minister and President of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), noted that "Christian congregations across the US decided to cease in-person worship to keep our parishioners and communities safe... We have never 'closed' the church, just the buildings."

Zoom meetings, zoom fellowship and even zoom worship remain good options to stay connected. As we continue to worship online this fall, we are investigating options for livestream worship on Sundays. We may broadcast live from the sanctuary soon, even though we are not inviting everyone physically into to that space again before all is ready for you.

You may find that some meetings and outdoor events will occur on the property this fall, and we plan to be in the minister's office at various times during the week, allowing face to face visits at church or elsewhere, outdoors with masks and distance for our mutual protection.

Between now and the end of the year in whatever ways we worship and come together, let us get to know and love you, even as we become known to you. We anticipate the many ways we can begin to connect, to hear your stories and to welcome you into this ministry of creative transformation together.

KEL'S KORNER

During this past month the question of, "are we having our annual Pumpkin Patch" has been asked by many people and has been discussed thoroughly by church leadership. In September, after a lengthy discussion the Cabinet decided to cancel the Pumpkin Patch due to Covid-19 related health concerns, primarily safely unloading the pumpkins off the truck.

This decision was entirely motivated by the desire to be good public health stewards and not from lack of desire to have the Patch. Church leadership recognizes that in addition to being a fundraiser, the Pumpkin Patch has become an important and anticipated event for both the church and the community. In wanting to continue a beloved tradition the Cabinet has approved a proposal to self-fund and "Adopt our Pumpkin Patch."

This year, instead of the Navajos in Farmington providing us with 1,200-1,500 pumpkins to offload and sell, we will be purchasing approximately 500 pumpkins from Tanaka Farms in Irvine. The Farm will deliver the pumpkins in boxes on pallets and the farm's delivery crew will unload them off the truck. We would then need to unpack the boxes of pumpkins and arrange them in the

patch. The order will cost approximately \$2,500. This price includes a 20% discount for nonprofits and a delivery fee of \$150.

We are asking the Church of the Foothills family to help "Adopt our Pumpkin Patch" with a donation of \$25 or more. We are already feeling the love for the Patch with 2 church members already committed to a donation of \$500. If you are interested in supporting the Patch by making a donation, please contact Pastor Kel or the church office.

I agree with the sentiment that the Pumpkin Patch has become a loved and valued tradition. I am thrilled that we once again making the neighborhood feel like fall by providing a very need light and life for both the church and the neighborhood....time to break out the orange hair dye.

Sharing the Bread: World Communion Sunday and Our Global Presence

In the days following the tragic warehouse explosion in Beirut, local bakeries were baking and sharing free bread by the truckload. Even before the blast, life was difficult in Lebanon. Political unrest, an ongoing financial crisis, and the weight of the COVID-19 pandemic all contributed to a seemingly impossible situation. Then, the explosion killed more than 190 people; injured more than 6,500; and left an estimated 300,000 homeless in the Greater Beirut area. The number of injured people and damaged medical facilities put a further strain on the already over-burdened healthcare system. Hospital overcrowding contributed to an escalated spread of disease.

In this challenging time, long-standing denominational partners in Lebanon and the region are working to adapt and meet a wide range of needs. With many refugees in the area from nearby Syria and Palestine, our network of partners have a long history of serving some of the most vulnerable. Now, they are expanding their reach to serve people in need of housing as a result of the explosion; those without access to food or water; as well as those who were injured or lost loved ones. The comprehensive response addresses housing needs, food security, health and hygiene, as well as access to education and employment.

In many ways, the needs seem overwhelming. But *Global Ministries Global Mission* Intern Leda Zakarison notes all the ways in which people reached out to help their neighbors in the days following the explosion- from donating blood and supplies, to welcoming strangers into their homes and sharing bread.

As Christians from many denominations and traditions prepare to celebrate *World Communion Sunday on October 4*, the image of sharing bread together in the wake of a crisis is particularly powerful. As Disciples of Christ, communion reminds us that we are part of a larger body; a movement transcending time and space. At the center of this celebration, the table symbolizes our shared faith, which overcomes all kinds of barriers- cultural, geographical, and otherwise.

Peter Makari of Global Ministries shares that some of our partners sustained damage to their own facilities, which they must address while continuing to meet the needs of those affected by the explosion, the financial crisis, and the ongoing pandemic. But, he says, they remain committed to engaging the community and serving those in need, even as they deal with their own challenges. He says it's a reminder that "a sense of community transcends sectarian lines, and goes beyond helping out only one's own." He says that people are truly coming together, working not just to meet immediate needs, but to address the broader, systemic issues that led to the compound disasters in the first place.

This year on *World Communion Sunday*, more than ever, we are aware of how interconnected this Body is. A global pandemic has shown us that what affects one part affects all of its members; and when one part of our human family suffers, we all suffer. Our interdependence is key to common thriving. In this season of great need, the communion table becomes more than a symbol. Just as we share in the abundance of God, so we are called to share with our whole human family in tangible ways, regardless of barriers.

Through *Week of Compassion*, your compassion is at work in Lebanon, and in many other places around the world where people are in need. Your support shares the bread of life in many ways, in many places. It is a true communion that gives life, extending the welcome of our table around the world. What better way to celebrate the compassionate way of Christ: on World Communion Sunday, or any day of the year.
